Since last reporting to you, we have had a very successful formal lunch at the CIT and I hope

Over 20 ladies attended our short but moving commemorative service at the War Memorial in early October. We would love to have more and remind you that it is open to all DFWA members, not just widows. This was the last time that Chaplain Catie Inches-Ogden participated in our special events as she has been posted to

Sydney, on promotion. We thank her for her contribution over the last two years and wish her well. We will definitely miss her cams and boots. Catie kindly found a replacement for us and we look forward to getting to know Chaplain Sarah Gibson.

We have continued our most important task of contacting new widows in the local region. In the last 12 months we have contacted 56 new widows; 31 of whom have been added to our support list giving us a total of 361 widows/ widowers. We continue to do this over the Christmas New Year period as we appreciate that a death at a time when most are on holiday and in celebratory mood, is doubly difficult.



REFLECTION

If your husband served during REMEMBRANCE DAY World War II, you are now

This year I had the honour of being asked to conduct the Remembrance Day Ceremony at the Jindalee Aged Narrabundah. Care Residence. Jindalee is the single largest aged care residence in Canberra and is the home to many veterans and

families of veterans. It was a privilege to be amongst these people who still recall the bitterness of World War 2 and subsequent conflicts. It was also a privilege to share that special moment with such special people. The following is extracted from my address given on that day:

There is no doubt that war is hell. We were reminded of the brutally dangerous conditions that confront our brave men and women only last week when we watched and listened to our Governor General present the Victoria Cross to Corporal Daniel Keighran for a conspicious act of valour in the presence of the enemy whilst on duty in Afghanistan in 2010. Her Excellency, in presenting the award, read the following official citation:

Corporal Keighran, with complete disregard for his own safety, broke cover on multiple occasions to draw intense and accurate enemy fire to identify enemy locations and direct return fire. During one of these occasions, when his patrol sustained a casualty, he again, on his own initiative and in an act of exceptional courage moved from his position of cover to deliberately draw fire away from the team who were treating the casualty. Corporal Keighran remained exposed to heavy fire in order to direct suppressing fire and then assist in the clearance of the landing zone to enable evacuation of the casualty. These deliberate acts of exceptional courage to repeatedly expose himself to accurate and intense enemy fire, thereby placing himself in grave danger, ultimately enabled the Committee Structure

identification and suppression of enemy firing positions.

We can only wonder at just what was going through Corporal Keighran's mind as he left the safety of his position and deliberately made himself into a target so that he could locate the enemy and then have the enemy shoot at him so that a wounded soldier, his mate, could be extracted and brought to safety. Our wonder is now only matched by the fact that his wife back in Australia did not become aware of her husband's incomprehensible bravery for two years, when just three weeks ago she heard that he was to receive the Victoria Cross. Initially, far from being proud of her husband's bravery she became

angry. She thought of the sleepless nights she endured wondering whether she would ever see her husband again. Knowing her husband though she assumed that he would realise his family responsibilities and take the necessary precautions to ensure he returned to care for his family. She soon realized though that the wounded soldier could have been her husband and someone else would have acted just as bravely to bring her husband to safety. Her

muted anger gave way to natural pride in her husband's heroic deeds.

The point of my message is that today it is only right that we remember the incredible bravery of the members of the defence force, in particular those whose last breath is taken on foreign lands. Yet how often do we stop to think of the incredible acts of courage and personal sacrifice made every day by the families of these brave men and women remaining at home. Fully aware of the possible fate that awaits their partners and constantly consumed by the worry over their safety, wondering if they will ever see them again, these selfless men and women assume the unaided role of running a family, of caring for children, comforting them as they too worry for their parents performing acts of courage similar to that of Corporal Keighran.
